Easter Sunday of the resurrection of the Lord ~ 20 April 2025

Seeing is not always believing. A bright light in the night sky could be a star or an airliner. A compelling work of art could be from an artistic master, or it might be a fraud. An empty tomb could just as easily be evidence of grave robbery as evidence of something supernatural. Yes, believing is often preceded by seeing, but deep-down, faith filled believing requires more than eyesight. The followers of Jesus brought physical sight to the tomb. They saw the evidence of a stone rolled away and burial clothes rolled up and put aside. They may have initially assumed that the body of their friend was disrespected even in death. But they had been shaped by their experience of Jesus and knew that everything about him stirred their hearts and ignited their imaginations to hope in what seemed unlikely or even impossible. That empty tomb was not evidence of a crime; it was evidence of the power of God to bring life where death once dwelled. Faith certainly can be rooted in physical realities that our senses can detect; our senses can attune us to wonder and awe. But faith takes us further. It gives us the courage to leap into trusting in God's surprises. It helps us move from wishful thinking to investing ourselves in what we know in our hearts to be true: that with God all things are indeed possible.

Easter makes a promise, the promise that we will experience in our own bodies the fullness of life. Every sincere act of forgiveness, each act of service, and all forms of true worship ready our hearts for the fullness of the Kingdom of God.

Liturgy of the Word \sim Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord

First Reading (Acts 10:34.37-43) We hear part of an early sermon of Peter. *Second Reading* (Col 3:1-4) Through our Baptism we already share in the risen life of Christ, though in a hidden and mysterious way. *Gospel* (Jn 20:1-9) On discovering that Jesus' tomb is empty, the disciples begin to grasp what the scriptures had foretold, namely, that he would rise from the dead.

Next weeks readings: Acts 5:12-16; Rev 1:9-13.17-19; Jn 20:19-31.

Scripture Note

The reading from Acts is part of an early sermon of Peter. In it he summarises the ministry of Jesus, which culminated in his death. But it didn't end there—God raised him to life, allowing him to be seen by certain witnesses.

Peter is one of those witnesses. He goes on to declare that Jesus is the one all the prophets spoke about, namely, the Messiah.

All who believe in him will have their sins forgiven.

The Gospel tells about the discovery of the empty tomb. The empty tomb (with the discarded linen cloths) in itself is not a direct proof of the resurrection.

Nevertheless, it was the first step towards establishing the truth that Jesus had escaped the bonds of death, and it prepared the disciples to encounter the risen Lord. Many readings of the Easter cycle were meant to instruct the newly baptised on the Christian way of life. Today's Second Reading is a good example. Thus the Easter season provides us with an opportunity to reflect on what it means to be baptised members of Christ's Body.
